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**BURNSVILLE AWARDED \$14,000 GRANT FOR CROSSWALK UPGRADE FROM
AARP COMMUNITY CHALLENGE**

The City of Burnsville was one of 129 national recipients – and one of only four from Minnesota – of the 2018 AARP Community Challenge grant program. The City was awarded \$14,000 to help install a vibrant crosswalk and pedestrian safety measures at one of the City’s intersections needing improvement.

In 2017, the City reviewed and improved its “Crosswalk Policy” to create more uniformity in crosswalks throughout Burnsville. The crosswalk at Girard Avenue South/Burnsville Parkway was identified as an area needing improvements.

The grant will allow the City to install “Rectangular Rapid-Flashing Beacons” (RRFB) at the Girard Avenue South/Burnsville Parkway intersection. This new feature will provide flashing amber beacons that can be activated by pedestrians to alert drivers that they are using the crosswalk.

RRFBs are solar powered LEDs that supplement warning signs at pedestrian crossings. The push of a button starts an irregular flash pattern to get drivers’ attention.

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AARP Community Challenge Announces 129 Grantees

WASHINGTON, DC—Today, AARP announced the awardees for its 2018 [AARP Community Challenge](#) grant program. A total of \$1.3 million will be distributed to fund 129 “quick action” projects across the country, helping communities make immediate improvements and jumpstart long-term progress to support residents of all ages. Nearly 1,600 applications were received from non-profits and government entities for the program, now in its second year. Each of the projects, which must be completed by November 5, is designed to achieve one or more of the following outcomes:

- **Deliver a range of transportation and mobility options** that increase connectivity, walkability, bikeability, and/or access to public and private transit.
- **Create vibrant public places** that improve open spaces, parks and access to other amenities.
- **Support the availability of a range of housing** that increases accessible and affordable housing options.

The Community Challenge grant program is part of AARP’s nationwide Livable Communities initiative that helps communities become great places to live for residents of all ages. AARP staff and volunteers are working with roughly 300 communities across the country, engaging and mobilizing community residents, delivering technical assistance and expertise to local leaders and organizations, and supporting the work of the 275 communities and two states that have enrolled in the [AARP Network of Age Friendly States and Communities](#).
